From the Manse



Dear friends

One of the issues taking up a lot of time in URC circles is an initiative called 'Radical Welcome.' This is being plugged together with an advertising campaign called 'Zero Intolerance.' It is proving controversial. And there are worries that it may yet cause more problems than it hopes to solve. But, as a church, Holly Mount have agreed to begin to explore what that means. And you will hear a lot more about that over the next few months.

Radical Welcome is both interesting and puzzling at the same time. On the surface it says a Christian church should welcome everybody, no matter who they are, what they've done, or what they look like. We can all agree with that, can't we? Jesus welcomed prostitutes, tax-collectors, thieves, lepers, all sorts. So the campaign wants churches to look at how they welcome people, and how they operate, in order to help that welcome be greater.

There are, of course, problems that go with that. These things are never as simple as they first seem. And, in our group of churches,

both Malvern Link and Worcester URC's have decided – for different, but legitimate reasons – not to take part in the campaign, whereas Holly Mount will begin exploring what this campaign means. But it doesn't stop any of us beginning to explore how well, or badly, we welcome other people.

There are obvious things we can make sure we do. For a start, we can make sure we don't put the most miserable person in the church on door duty. We can make the church itself warm, welcoming and attractive. We can make sure our notice boards are up to date and give the information that's needed. We can invite new faces to events that are going on. We can be 'friendly.'

They are all good things the church, as a whole, can do. But an attitude of welcome can only flow out of an understanding of how much we are welcomed and loved. When you really know that God loves you, and that, no matter what, that love does not end, it can change your heart. When you know that Christ came as a baby in the manger, for you; that he lived for you, and died for you, not just because he had to, but because he really wanted to, then perhaps you can begin to live in that joy. And when we live in the joy of the good news of Jesus, then our lives begin to reflect an even greater welcome.

'Smile,' goes the old saying, 'And the world smiles with you.' The world wants everyone to pretend to be happy at Christmas. That's not right or possible. You can only smile properly when you really know, deep down, that, despite everything this world throws at you, you still have a lot to smile about. Real smiling can't be faked. It's something to do with the eyes. And when our eyes are fixed on Jesus, then we have a real smile.

So, can I encourage all of you, not just the Elders and officers, to try to make others welcome. If a new face turns up in your normal pew at worship, make a fuss of them. Welcome them.

Help them feel at ease. Just think what you would feel like if you were in their shoes. But also, begin to live in the joy of knowing that the real Radical Welcome is the one that God has given you, when you don't deserve it. Live in that. And then others may catch it from you as you go along. As we head towards Christmas, don't go, 'Bah, humbug!' but say thank you, and let others feel your gratitude.

About Us

Our aim is to ensure that every disabled child has an opportunity to be something special...a kid.

There are an estimated 70,000 disabled children and young people in the UK waiting for a wheelchair that fits their young lives. That's where we come in. Whizz-Kidz provides disabled children with the essential wheelchairs and other mobility equipment they need to lead fun and active childhoods.

The wheelchair is just the start...

Giving a disabled child a wheelchair is just the start of their journey with Whizz-Kidz. All around the country disabled children and young people are meeting and making friends at our growing network of local clubs. They're having fun whizzing around obstacle courses, knocking over skittles, doing wheelies and learning about boring but important things like road safety at our wheelchair skills courses. They're forming campaign groups and meeting MPs, contacting the press, and designing campaign badges and posters. And because growing up can be a bit scary, they're taking part in our work placement programme and building confidence at our life skills events.

Facts

Here are some key facts about disabled children that not only reinforce the need for our service, but also highlight the importance of ensuring we meet every disabled child's individual needs.

There are an estimated 70,000 disabled children in the UK who could benefit

from appropriate mobility equipment. This is approximately 10% of the total disabled child population.

29% people with a disabled child in the household live in poverty, compared with 21% of households with no disabled children.

84% of families with a disabled child are in debt compared to 47% of households with no disabled child.

It costs on average 3 times as much to raise a disabled child as a non-disabled child.

1/3 of parents with a severely disabled child aged 2 and under use more than 3 pieces of equipment daily.

Disabled young people are over twice as likely as non-disabled young people not to be in education, employment or training.

The levels of unmet need for services by families with disabled children from black and minority ethnic communities (BME) have been found to be higher than for white families.

Since 1975, the fastest growth in numbers of disabled people has been for children – from 476,000 disabled children under the age of 16 in 1975, to 772,000 in 2002. This represents an increase of 62%.

An African Christmas?

Visiting Africa back in September made me realise just how fortunate we are in the Western World.

When we arrived in Nairobi it was just about time to finish work. There is not a lot of work in this city but those who are fortunate to have a job are glad of it.

We watched them come out of work and cross the road to find a small area of mud, dirt...call it what you like, make a small fire then, if they can find something to sit on. A spare piece of plastic sheeting is a luxury as this can be used in the same way we use a windbreak at the seaside. As time passed the other members of their families came to join them often, just sitting on the ground. This was where they rested for the night until they could go to work again the following morning.

What did they eat??? If a few ears of maize was found it would be cooked on the fire and attempts made to sell this to passing motorists for a few Kenyan shillings. If the people were able to sell any then the family may be able to go and buy some bread or other foodstuffs to make a hot meal....but we did not see much evidence of this happening. The water was collected from a nearby river or stream.

As Christmas approaches I do wonder what these people will do over this period....I suspect the same as any other day. Will the children have gifts...I doubt it. Will they eat their equivalent of a Christmas diner...I don't think so. Will they sit in a comfortable chair to rest....no.

The one thing they all do is something we do not do enough of and that is smile. They always have a smile on their faces wherever they are going, whatever they do they are joyful in Spirit. The love of our Lord is evident all around with Churches every few miles. Services are taken buy the side of the River and they thank God for all they have.

As we sit at the end of Christmas day, full from all the food we have eaten, surrounded by gifts galore with more chocolate and fruit that we can eat, please spare a thought for these people of Nairobi who will probably have nothing more than an ear of maize.

Table Tennis

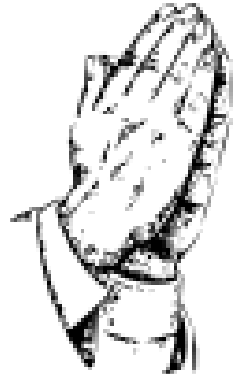


Table Tennis will be taking a rest in December as we all get ready for Christmas.

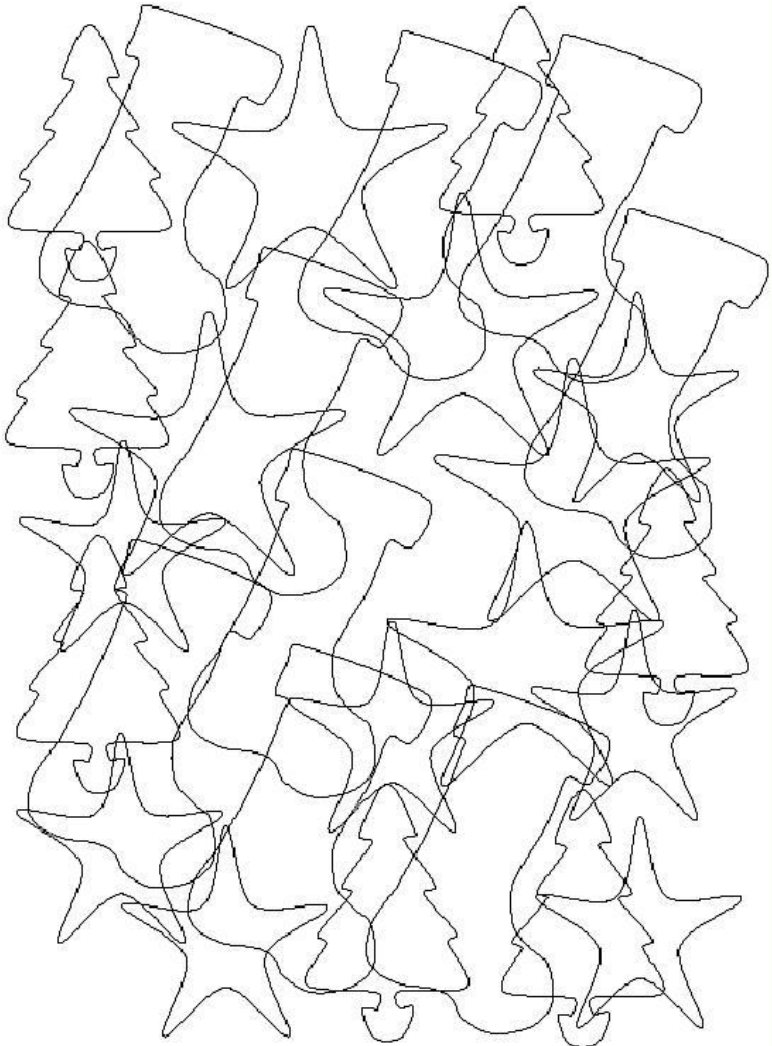
