From the Manse



Dear Friends,

In the book of Ecclesiastes you will find some very sound advice and a lot of common sense. He reminds us that there is nothing new under the sun; he tells us that the wise have their eyes open while fools walk in the dark. His poem which begins 'There is a season for everything, a time for every occupation under heaven' is probably his best known passage.

But I want to take you to chapter 5 where 'The Preacher' imparts some simple words of wisdom: 'When you make a promise to God, do not delay in fulfilling it – it is better not to make the promise than to make one and not fulfil it.' You won't be surprised to know that with these words comes a story!

Once upon a time (at the start of the 12th Century to be precise), a strange oddly shaped little man was visiting Rome. His name was Rahere and his occupation was Jester to the court of Henry 1. While in Rome he became ill and was convinced he was going to die – no NHS for him! He waited for death and as he waited, like many others in his situation, he decided to call on God for help, after all, what had he to lose?

He promised God that if he recovered he would show his gratitude by helping others who were ill. In time Rahere recovered – but what to do about his promise? One night he had a dream and in the dream he was back in London at the king's court. He saw himself ask the king for a swampy bog called Smooth Field – end of dream. And so Rahere journeys

back to London, back to his old employer to ask for the plot of land. After much abuse and perseverance the king eventually gave him the land.

As is the way with good stories, it wasn't long before the little man won the hearts of the children who lived near Smooth Field. They began to help him collect stones and soon their parents were helping too. Rahere explained his simple plan to anyone who would listen. Most treated him like the jester he once was, but some were impressed. A few gave money, others handed over building materials and many gave of their time and effort which was all they had.

Gradually a building began to rise up on the Field. First a tiny church and then alongside it, a much larger building were completed. You've no doubt realised by now that this is no fairy tale. The buildings became known as St Bartholomew's and a modern, well equipped and world famous hospital now stands on that same site, still caring for the sick just as it did 800 plus years ago.

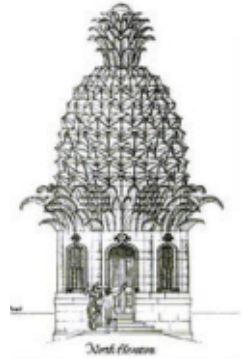
And it all began with a promise – a promise made and a promise kept. Rahere had probably never heard of Ecclesiastes or The Preacher or those words from chapter 5 but he knew instinctively that when you make a promise to God, don't delay in keeping it. It's a message that's true for us today as it was for Rahere all those years ago, for haven't we all made our promises to God?

The United Reformed Church has always taken its global responsibilities seriously.

One important way we express this is through Commitment for Life. Commitment for Life is about helping bring fullness of life to all people through generous and just stewardship. Today more than 40 per cent of United Reformed Churches support Commitment for Life. But with the economic crisis still being felt around the world, we need to encourage others to join us so that the great work of Christian Aid and the World Development Movement can grow.

John Marsh, Moderator of the General Assembly, visited Zimbabwe earlier this year. He travelled to Nyampanda, near the Mozambique border, to visit a vocational training project run by Silveira House, one of the many partners supported by Commitment for Life.

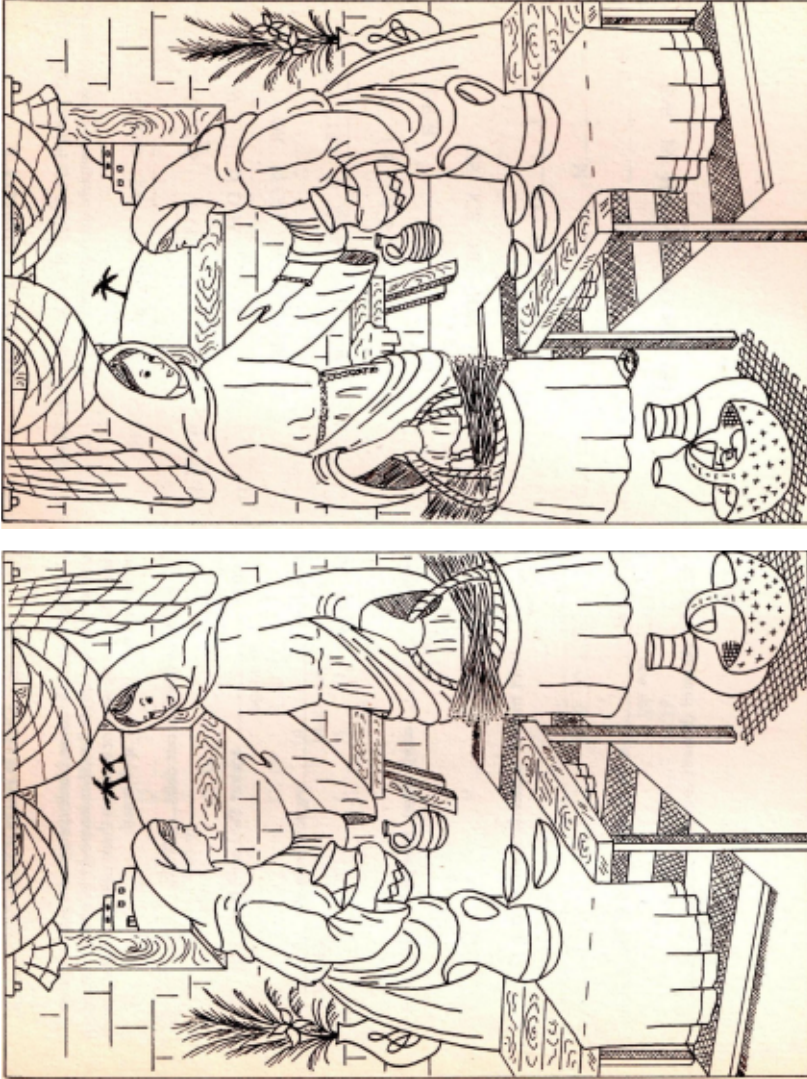
Those involved in the project were keen to show what they had achieved.

Christian Aid Update



Roger Morris has received the following update from Christian Aid.

You will be pleased to know that Worcester churches raised a lot more money for Christian Aid in 2010 than we did last year. The total was £28,037.60 - compared with £25,525.82 collected in 2009.

In addition, we sent about £860 that had been given slightly earlier (some people can't wait for Christian Aid Week!!) to buy wells, and a further small sum was sent later.

All the money mentioned above was further increased by gift-aiding. So I am writing to thank you for all your hard work in organising this year's collection in your local Church. Please pass on the thanks of Christian Aid to your team of collectors, and do let your minister know the amount raised by your church (see below).

The world has some terrible problems, so although England had an austerity budget this year, many people overseas would welcome a bit of our austerity!

The total raised by your Church was £526.90.

The dates for Christian Aid for 2011 are May 15 to 21. I look forward to working with you again in 2011.

Malvern Update



Following the statement announcement in the August Bulletin re a prospective new minister, we are able to inform you of the following arrangements:

Sunday 29 August 2010 - Our prospective minister will preach with a view at our 11:00 am service in Worcester and then go onto Holly Mount URC at Malvern for a joint Malvern URC service to preach with a view at 3.00pm.

Saturday 18 September 2010 - The 'social' which had been earmarked for Saturday 28 August has now been changed. It will take place at Malvern Link URC from 4pm - 7pm and will probably take the form of a presentation and discussion.

Obviously members from all 3 churches will be welcome and encouraged to come along. It's possible that we may be asked to contribute to the proceedings by bringing along some cakes but I will advise on that nearer the time.

Monday 20 September 2010 - 7:30pm - There will be a combined meeting for all members and regular attenders of all 3 churches in order to vote on whether the minister will be issued with a call. It has been agreed that there will be a single vote by the 3 churches by a show of hands. There will not be an opportunity to vote by proxy so if you want to vote it's important that you try and attend!

This meeting will take place at Malvern Link URC.

In view of the importance of this decision for the future of our 3 churches we do hope as many of you as possible will be able to attend and have the opportunity to meet the candidate!

At this moment in time we cannot divulge information regarding the candidate's name and where they are presently in ministry.

Even after you have had the opportunity to meet this person we would ask folk to respect their wishes and not broadcast details until if and when a call has been made and accepted.

We will try and arrange transport for those who want to go across to Malvern as long as you let us know. I will create a list at the back of church for those who want to go and require transport

Both Jim, Rev Roger Woodall (Interim Moderator) and the elders here in Worcester and at Holly Mount and Malvern Link would be grateful for your understanding and co-operation in this matter.


