From the Manse



Dear Friends,

The Collins English Dictionary says this about “language”:

1. a system for the expression of thoughts or feelings by the use of spoken sounds or conventional symbols;
2. The faculty for the use of such systems which is the distinguishing characteristic of man as compared with other animals.

It says other things as well but it's on these two that I'll concentrate for the moment. For it seems that there are times and places where neither 1 nor 2, together or separately, actually achieve what is set out to achieve. Examples are usually found in those foreign places where English is not the first language, and mistakes, often funny, are made by those who try to put their sentiments across to people who, mostly, can't be bothered to speak any language but their own..

This sign was found in a cocktail lounge in Norway: 'Ladies are requested not to have children in the bar.' Now I suspect we know what they mean but its not exactly what they've said. Here's a few more. Seen in a doctor's office in Rome: 'Specialist in women and other diseases.'

An information booklet in Japan about using the hotel's air conditioning says this: 'Cools and heats - if you want condition of warm air in your room, please control yourself.'

'In case of fire, do your utmost to alarm the hotel porter', from Vienna. And in Paris you might find this on a hotel reception desk: 'please leave your values at the front desk.'

And finally we go to Moscow, to a hotel across from a Russian Orthodox monastery: 'You are welcome to visit the monastery and its cemetery where famous composers and writers are buried daily except Thursday.' Even grave diggers need a day off I suppose! Who knows, maybe I'll find a few more over the next couple of weeks in Malta - watch this space.

Any way, you get the picture. Just a couple of letters or a missing comma can make all the difference. What then, do we make of a an ancient manuscript without full stops or commas or sentences or even vowels, which is then quoted by a man speaking Aramaic, which in turn is heard by Greek and Latin speakers and which is eventually turned into ancient English and is now in modern English? And of course I'm talking about our Bible.

Much has been said and written in recent days by clergy and media alike about getting back to biblical values. I'm not so sure that we know just what they are and anyway, who decides what to adhere to and what can be sidelined?

What I am certain of is that the word of God for his people can be found in its pages. What I am also certain of is that if we were to use parts 1 and 2 of the dictionary explanation of 'language' to better effect, and more people were to hear our thoughts and our feelings about our bible and our faith, then the kingdom of God would be a whole lot nearer.

Calling all singers to Saltaire!



Love singing and looking for an August bank holiday activity with a difference? Then look no more. Head to beautiful Saltaire United Reformed Church in West Yorkshire and join in August Praise; an attempt to sing all 1021 hymns in Complete Mission Praise (1st edition).

Organised by Mrs Valerie Jenkins, church member of Saltaire URC, the marathon singing session is estimated to take 42 hours and will mark the centenary of the 1910 Edinburgh World Missionary Conference (the forerunner of the modern ecumenical movement) and the 25th anniversary of the publication of the first edition of Mission Praise hymn book. "But" laughs Mrs. Jenkins, "don't think we are asking the impossible and expecting singers to sign up for the whole 42 hours - we've divided the time into half-hour sessions and are encouraging enthusiastic soloists, choirs, groups of family, friends, colleagues to commit to one or more thirty minute slots" "It will", continues Mrs Jenkins, "be a fantastic way to spend all or part of the Bank Holiday weekend. We're inviting local singers as well as those from further afield. Saltaire village is a world heritage site and buzzing with activity during bank holiday weekends, so an hour or so singing could be just be one part of a day out. So far church groups, choirs, families and

duets have all signed up - but we have plenty of room for others to join. Whoever you are and wherever you are we would love to welcome you to Saltaire next month. Musical talent is an asset, but enthusiasm is essential!"

Moderator gets on his bike



On Monday morning (19 July) the Revd Richard Church, moderator of the North Western Synod of the United Reformed Church, is setting off on a month long cycle ride around the North West, visiting communities, churches and projects the length and breadth of the region.

Richard's journey begins in Macclesfield and will finish in Barrow-in-Furness on Sunday 15 August. Along the way he will be visiting a range of people, places and projects including the Carpenters Arms in Charlestown and Kirkham prison as well as popping in to a Teddy bear's picnic in Stockport, which will raise funds for Francis House. Mr Church will also share in ecumenical worship at Furness Abbey. At various points on his journey he will be accompanied by keen cyclists from partner churches from several denominations, including the Methodists, Baptists and Anglicans.

Talking about the reasons for his trip, Richard says, "Often people describe the church as an out of touch and staid part of society - far removed from the dynamic movement Jesus started. I'm hoping that my marathon ride, and the places I visit, will clearly show people that the Church is not stuck but is a vibrant and loving part of many communities throughout the North West, working for good and offering hope to people through the gospel."

United Reformed Church hits the airwaves



On Sunday 11 July the Revd John Marsh, past moderator of the General Assembly and the Revd Dr Kirsty Thorpe, current moderator, both took part in BBC radio Sunday broadcasts.

Mr Marsh featured twice on BBC Hereford & Worcester Sunday morning programme, first leading the half hour Sunday service with Bible readings from Genesis and Hebrews, hymns and prayers, and then in a live interview with the programme's presenter, Andrew Easton.

In the interview, Mr Marsh talked about the role of moderator, the reformed tradition and how the URC, as a reformed church is "more willing to be a little bit experimental, because that's the nature of reformation; you are pushing the edges and moving across boundaries, looking at new possibilities and new ways.

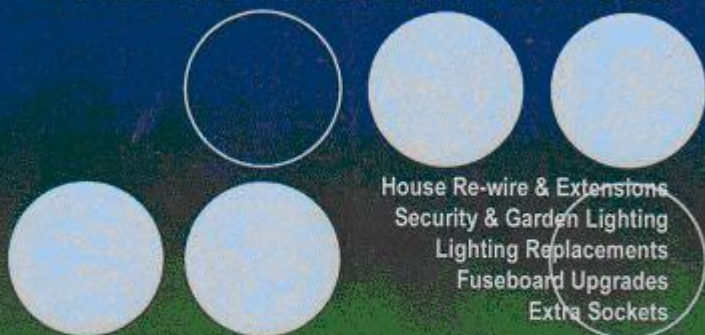
